

MISSION

Rooted Wisdom Africa, formerly Into Your Hands Africa, empowers youth and families in rural Uganda through education and enterprise development.

Purpose

Rooted Wisdom Africa (RWA) is focused on building the capacity of communities in south-central Uganda for longterm, continued success. We begin by dialogue with the community, and our programs are then designed and adjusted to meet their stated needs. Our customized blueprint, which combines education and enterprise and is led from the inside out, is key to long-term sustainability.

We currently operate in the community of Kikinene and the ten surrounding villages, located in the Kisseka sub-county of the Lwengo District of eastern Uganda.

Success and sustainability come from working with communities to develop and support local leaders. While many organizations depend on an influx offoreign workers and investment, we know that communities want to create value and improve their own circumstances—we help them start that journey.

HOW OUR PROGRAMS WORK

We evaluate success based on observable changes within the family and community units. Understanding that poverty is a complex issue, our model includes multiple services at various stages of development. As such, a family may have a student enrolled in our Life Skills program, another child in the Collegiate Education Training Program, a mother in the Women's Enterprise Training Program, and a father in our Farmer Field School Program.

While many organizations turn to technological solutions for addressing challenges in developing countries, we deliberately opt for cost-effective, low-tech approaches. Recognizing that community members living on less than 49 cents a day must be able to afford, replace, and access additional tools as needed, we prioritize solutions that are accessible and sustainable in the long run.





Life Skills Scholars Program

The Life Skills Program supports disadvantaged youth aged 12 to 22, focusing on girls (with a minimum target of 60% of scholarships allocated to female students). The program provides academic and material support, personal and professional development, and vocational training to improve employment opportunities and help graduates gain greater autonomy.



Program Reach in 2023:

433 Students and **156,260** free meals served

Program Impact:

- 97% annual retention rate and a 100% life skills graduation rate
- 71% of senior four graduates have plans to pursue further education
- **85**% of female students reported that the Life Skills program helped them avoid early marriage
- 90% of female students reported that the Life Skills program enabled them to avoid unwanted pregnancies



I was always scared of everything,

lacking confidence in school because I was constantly chased out to collect school fees. At some point, I even missed important school events like the prefect (student) election. Collegiate Education Training Program

The Collegiate Education Training Program aims to overcome high unemployment rates and meet local needs through vocational college scholarships that provide hands-on, skilled education that allows youth to compete in the job market or become job creators themselves while remaining in the area and meeting vital local needs.

Program Reach in 2023:

24 college scholarships Awarded

Program Impact:

- 100% graduation rate
- 100% employment rate post-graduation

Woman's Enterprise Training Program

The Women's Enterprise Training Program helps disadvantaged, vulnerable Ugandan girls and women become self-sufficient by combining education with business opportunities. Program activities include classes on creating enterprises, exposure visits to successful businesses, vocational and technical training on starting a small family business, and seed funding to launch or scale a business.



Program Reach in 2023:

145 Women and Youth

Program Impact:

- 98% of WETP graduates are employed
- 77% have started a new business/expanded a current business
- 15% have increased their ability to meet food requirements for their families
- 98% have more financial independence!

Meet Hakin Prisca

Prisca is a remarkable woman and mother of seven who joined the Women's Enterprise Training Program in 2023. Applying the market analysis skills acquired in her business classes, Prisca strategically utilized the program's startup funds to invest in pig farming. As the pigs multiplied, her income grew. Prisca diversified her business using some of her initial proceeds from her pigs to acquire a young cow. As it grew older, the cow, in turn, became a source of additional income. Later, Prisca strategically decided to sell the cow for a higher profit and reinvest the income earned to start another business. This time around, Prisca started a small retail shop where she began earning daily income in addition to continuing her livestock-rearing business. Today, Prisca is a proud owner of multiple successful businesses. Her once sought-after dream of building her own home is coming to fruition, with a new home currently under construction!

Agricultural Farming Initiatives

The Demonstration Farm Program (DFP) is designed to improve economic security through agricultural production. The DFP aims to foster sustainable farming practices that are economically efficient, locally appropriate, and profitable. The program has two interconnected components: 1) a Farmer Field School and 2) a Master Farmer Program. To ensure active female engagement, 50% of Farmer Field School and 65% of Master Farmer Program spots are held for female participants (though they have thus far been composed of much higher percentages of women).



Program Reach:

154 Farmers

Program Impact:

- 94,256 bundles of vegetables and crops grown
- Resulting in a generated income of \$44,277

Meet Annet Nantume

Annet joined the Farmer Field School program in 2023 with the aim of learning sustainable farming practices and reducing expenses while maintaining crop quality. "However, the program exceeded my expectations. I not only learned about vegetable cultivation and sustainable practices but also received training on the business aspects of farming. As a result, I now have vegetable gardens at home, and I own a vegetable stall in Nakawanga Village." Annet's customers primarily consist of her neighbors and people passing by her business. From her stall, Annet earns a regular income, averaging \$22.86 per week. Additionally, she saves \$1.42 in a Village Saving and Loan Association (VSLA) group.

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Rooted Wisdom Africa has six staff members, five of whom are located in Uganda and traditionally graduates of the organization's programs.

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Traveling WITH Purpose

Uganda Insight Trips

Every year, Rooted Wisdom Africa takes a handful of supporters to see our work on the ground. In 2023, a total of eight travelers journeyed to Uganda in July and November. Six days were spent immersed in village life-participating in Life Skills classes at our secondary schools, learning vocational skills from the women in our women's enterprise training program, visiting our vocational training schools and farmer field schools, and meeting some of our families at their homes. Five remaining days were spent in the wild, embarking on a gorilla trekking expedition and a safari at Queen Elizabeth National Park.



Program Participant Experience

"My wife, Julie, and I recently returned from an 11-day Ugandan mission trip with Rooted Wisdom Africa. What a rewarding experience! CELEBRATING GOOD NEWS

In 2022, Rooted Wisdom Africa proudly launched our first co-ed enterprise training program centered around a sponsored coffee plantation initiative. Alongside cultivating coffee, they've delved into the realm of snack production, mastering the art of crafting chapattis and desserts. The fruits of their labor have been exceptional.

The coffee venture they embarked upon has flourished, resulting in an impressive annual harvest of 40,000 coffee plants. This remarkable success has translated into an income of \$20,000 in 2023, a testament to the dedication and innovation these participants have shown in their entrepreneurial journey.

Meet Namuyige Teddy

Teddy is a farmer, growing coffee and matooke, and a graduate of our Women's Enterprise Training Program. She also practices cattle rearing and agriculture, or beekeeping, which gives her enough income to feed her family. "I was interested in beekeeping because it's not too tiresome and the materials are affordable." While Teddy started with just ten beehives, she now has fifty, allowing her to harvest 20 liters (5 gallons) of honey each month.

The skills Teddy gained in the Women's Enterprise Training Program have helped her to make the most of her agricultural projects. Through lessons in marketing, entrepreneurship, recordkeeping, and more, she has what she needs to take her business to the next level. She hopes to eventually pack her honey in jars and transport it to Kampala or Tanzania for better pay.

Teddy has also started teaching her neighbors about beekeeping. "They're slowly picking it up, which makes me happy because, hopefully, this knowledge will financially change other people's lives. "Her beekeeping project hasn't just funded household essentials—it also funded her daughter's education to become a doctor!
